Allegheny Land Trust purchased the 53-acre property in May 2022 from a private organization in a joint effort with the Glade Run Lake Conservancy to expand the protected area around the lake. Increasing the conservation buffer around the lake is part of a long-term effort to improve water quality in the lake for habitat health and preserve recreational access. Allegheny Land Trust transferred the property to the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission in October 2023, who manages the lake. As part of the transfer process, a deed restriction was recorded in the title that protects the trees for 40 years per the Preservation Protocol requirements and grants Allegheny Land Trust the rights to the carbon credits for the duration of the carbon project.

The project includes an early successional forest recovering from early 1900s through 1950s agricultural uses, with a mix of 64 to approximately 45 years old stands. The main tree species are silver and sugar maple, black walnut, and hickory at the field edges and black cherry dominating the former fields. The property is zoned Rural-Residential (Ag-A).

The sale of carbon credits was added to the scope of this project early in the process to ensure financial viability for the transfer to the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission because the costs are not otherwise funded.

5. Project Impacts

Glade Run Lake was established in 1955 by the federal government to 'provide a lake for public fishing'. The approximately 150-acre property was deeded to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania after construction. The property consists of the 52-acre lake and another ~100 acres surrounding the lake. The property is maintained and stocked by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC). In 2011 the lake was drained due to concerns about dam integrity and risk of flooding to downstream homes. Local citizens organized Glade Run Lake Conservancy, a 501(c)3 nonprofit, with approximately 2,500 members/supporters. GRLC led a grassroots effort to fundraise and work with local, county and state government to find ways to repair the dam. At a cost of approximately \$3.5 Million PFBC restored the dam and the lake in 2017.

With the advent of strong housing development pressure in the area, the health and protection of the lake's watershed has become a community focus. The excellent health of the approximate 2,000-acre watershed was evident when the lake was drained. Original stream channels could be seen and the root crowns of the tree stumps remaining in the lake showed there had been no silt deposition even after 60 years of operation. Dredging was not necessary.
